1. Hydroponic growing comes to EMS Science classrooms!

The Middle School science department recently purchased a hydroponic grower unit with grant funds from Northwestern Water and Sewer District. Students in Mrs. Smith's 4th quarter Environmental Science elective were the first to try it out. They started the seeds out in a covered tray in the classroom, transplanted the small sprouts in pods to the grower, and monitored the nutrient and pH levels of the water in the system over the course of about 5 weeks. They learned how to harvest and process the lettuce at the end of the growing cycle. The students harvested a little over 16 pounds of lettuce in their first attempt at growing hydroponically. A salad bar was served to the entire 7th grade student body with plenty to share amongst middle school teachers and the Environmental Science elective course. Several students commented on the amazing quality of the lettuce that was grown and many said it tasted better than any storebought lettuce they had previously! The hydroponic unit will be rotated around the science department so that each teacher can use the grower for a quarter within their classroom.





2. This year's Spring Arts Festival was another great success showcasing hundreds of students' works produced throughout the school year. The high school art program had over 60 first, second, and third place ribbons that were awarded. Two students were given the best of show, and they are Mary Deitrich (painting) and Olivia Stone (dog).



It's been another great year in the middle school art room, as outstanding student artwork was displayed at this year's Spring Arts Festival! Congratulations to all the winners. The middle school Best of Show this year was awarded to Allison Linthicum (7th) for her two-dimensional digital vector portrait and to Myria Sharninghouse (8th) for her three-dimensional sculpture.




3. Elmwood Local Schools Receives National Recognition from Project Lead The Way for Commitment to Empowering Students

Project Lead the Way is a national nonprofit organization that serves millions of PreK-12 students and teachers in over 12,200 schools across the U.S, aiming to make every student in every grade STEM successful.

There are over 220 high school across the state of Ohio and Elmwood is one of 12 to earn the recognition of being a Distinguished High School. This is the fourth consecutive year Elmwood High School has earned this recognition. Of the over 330 middle schools across the state, Elmwood also is one of 12 to earn the Distinguished Gateway Recognition. This is the sixth consecutive year that Elmwood Middle School has earned this recognition. PLTW high school and middle school programs prepare today's students for the careers of tomorrow, by not only incorporating STEM skills into their learning but building students' collaboration, teamwork and communication skills so they can be ready for whatever path they take

- -"List Maker" Badge (Student list has been updated)


They were working on the final four badges as the year ended.
